TABLE TALKS

TALKING ABOUT LIFE-LEARNING/UNSCHOOLING

Description: Likely you've seen life learning and unschooling in action as your child explores, asks questions and naturally builds on previous knowledge. These child-led educational approaches do not involve a curriculum, rather they involve supporting your child in their desired learning, and trusting that they will learn what they need to know. At this Table Talk, chat with homeschoolers about the benefits and challenges with this educational approach.

NURTURING YOUR HOMESCHOOLER'S PASSIONS

Description: Supporting your child's passions is a wonderful sentiment, but what does it mean? At this Table Talk, we look forward to discussing what your child is excited about and how supporting those interests may look. It can be challenging to support an interest that isn't easily identifiable as providing life skills, but let's delve into how those interests can provide opportunities for growth and mastery.

Homeschooling Neurodivergent Children

Description: Homeschooling any child can be a struggle sometimes, but homeschooling children who don't "fit the mould" can provide an extra layer of challenges. At the same time, homeschooling can provide our neurodivergent children with the freedom to develop in their own way. At this Table Talk, we'll talk about the real life struggles and successes of homeschooling students who are neurodivergent.

CREATING CO-OPS AND COORDINATING EVENTS

Description: Are you looking for a community to share experiences with? Do you have an idea for a club that you'd like to create for your kids to play with other homeschooled kids? Would you like to attend field trips with other homeschoolers? How do you go about finding your community? At this Table Talk, we will be discussing these questions and sharing how homeschoolers have created – and kept – their homeschool co-op community alive.

HOMESCHOOLING THE EARLY YEARS

(up to approx. 12 years old)

Description: It is natural to be born with a love of learning. How can you foster this love of learning and help your child(ren) develop a solid foundation for future learning? At this Table Talk, chat with two homeschoolers about the trial and error of developing an early years homeschool plan.

HOMESCHOOLING THE LATER YEARS

(teen years to graduation)

Description: Homeschooling during the teen years comes with unique challenges, such as planning for the future, providing opportunities for engaging with peers, and ensuring that plans are in place if further education (university, college, etc.) is anticipated. At this Table Talk, chat with homeschoolers to hear their experiences, ask your questions and to get inspiration as you homeschool your teen(s).

HOMESCHOOLING MULTIPLE AGES

Description: Homeschooling children of multiple ages can be challenging because there are just so many kids!! Juggling your time to meet the needs of each child and each subject, while dealing with frequent interruptions is a lot. However, it can also allow for unique opportunities like prioritizing teamwork, strengthening family bonds and developing character. At this Table Talk, we look forward to discussing some of the challenges and opportunities when simultaneously homeschooling children of different ages.

HOMESCHOOLING WITH ANXIETY

Description: Has your anxiety prevented you from taking part in homeschooling events or reaching out to fellow homeschoolers? Has it made it challenging to be the homeschooling parent you want to be for your child(ren)? At This Table talk, chat with homeschoolers who live with anxiety, hear about their challenges/successes, share your own (if you'd like) and, hopefully, feel comforted on your homeschooling journey.

WHAT DID HOMESCHOOLING LOOK LIKE IN YOUR HOME?

Unschooling system mainly. We were read to, did a very little bit of work books. Mostly played, went to museums, wrote in our journal, completed weekly project (of our choosing) and sometimes presented them to our parents.

WHAT WAS YOUR FAVORITE MEMORY?

There are so many, to name a few:

- MASH science fair when I made a maze for my rat.
- Playing in the Talent show put on by MASH
- Walking across the street ignoring the school crossing guard.
- Running through the Manitoba Museum on "school days" with my sisters.
- Endless camping and weekday sleepovers.

WERE YOU GLAD YOU WERE HOMESCHOOLED?

Do not rush. Do not worry so much. Kids WILL learn when they want to. Sometimes it takes a while and that is ok. Learning through play and experience is the most rewarding. Let your kids play and take the lead.

CARLEE FARMER

HOMESCHOOLED: Grade 4 to Grade 12 | **GRADUATED:** 2009

CAREER PATH

A few years after graduation I enrolled at the University of Winnipeg where I received a degree in Environmental Science in the forest ecology stream. I worked a variety of forestry jobs from coastal BC to Northern Manitoba. These were great years spent doing what I loved most, exploring the outdoors. In 2022 me and my husband opened a sawmill company called Urban Lumber. We recycle the cities urban trees removed due to disease or decline that would otherwise be burnt or landfilled. We saw, kiln dry and sell both raw lumber and finished furniture products. I never expected to be a business owner, but have found great fulfillment in it. Since opening we have been able to recycle over 5000 trees. We hope to one day divert the majority of Winnipeg's trees from the landfill to our facility.

WHAT DID HOMESCHOOLING LOOK LIKE IN YOUR HOME?

My parents leaned more towards the life learning approach. We were giving the freedom to pursue whatever interested us. For me that looked like running wild outdoors in the summer, and leaning as much as I could about plants, animals, and nature.

WHAT WAS YOUR FAVORITE MEMORY?

The countless hours of uninterrupted and uninhibited play with my sisters.

WERE YOU GLAD YOU WERE HOMESCHOOLED?

Absolutely. I had wonderful childhood due in a large part to homeschooling.

JOSH FRIESEN

HOMESCHOOLED: Grade 1 to Grade 6 | **GRADUATED:** 2008

CAREER PATH: One Year College, Apprenticeship in Trades, Now

Own Home Building Company and Homeschooling Dad

WHAT DID HOMESCHOOLING LOOK LIKE IN YOUR HOME?

I was originally enrolled in public school for grade 1. They went on strike, so mom pulled me out of school (i also cried all the way to and from school every day) and home schooled me. I was schooled in a fairly structured format.

WHAT WAS YOUR FAVORITE MEMORY?

The amount of playing and unstructured learning my brother and I did. Free time galore, spending time with parents, getting to do things out of season or while kids are in school.

WERE YOU GLAD YOU WERE HOMESCHOOLED?

Yes

WORDS OF ADVICE:

As a participant in home school, public school, and private school I would encourage home schoolers to be excited that they are taking control of their own education. They get to learn at their pace, about the things that interest them, and learn in more creative, outside of the box ways. The creativity and ingenuity that comes out of home schooling is wonderful and exciting. Keep on being excited about learning, nobody can teach you that!

We are happy to answer any questions you may have about homeschooling and welcome all phone calls, emails and visits.

Common questions we assist parents with are resource considerations, high school programming, applying to post-secondary, providing copies of reviewed forms and recommendations for assessments for academics and special learning needs. ASK YOUR LIASIONS

Some of your questions came up so frequently, we went straight to the source, the Homeschooling Office Liaison Officers. See what they said:

HOW DO YOU APPROACH FILLING IN HOMESCHOOLING FORMS WHEN YOU USE A CHILD-LED/UNSCHOOLING "CURRICULUM"?

The Liaison Officers from the Homeschooling Office encourage parents to call and have a conversation about what they are planning on covering, what interests the students have expressed and how they will cover that content. We would go over resource options and provide samples of forms. Being child-led/child-centered/unschooling does not mean parents are not planning and finding resources to cover interests and challenge student learning. Parents are legally required to cover the four mandated subject areas. Saying: "My student has no interest in math," does not exempt them from having a math program that meets equivalence. Parents have the responsibility to provide the Homeschooling Office with a program outline for each mandated subject area describing their overarching plan, naming their main resources and demonstrating they are meeting the requirement of equivalence. If, along the way, they change topic (like they started with volcanoes and moved to earth's crust in science) or resources (like they tried Saxon math and decide to switch to Jump math), they would report that in the appropriate progress report and detail their new plan for learning. A conversation with a Liaison Officer is the optimal way to ensure a program outline for child-centered learning meets equivalence.

WHAT ARE THE OPTIONS FOR POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION FOR HOMESCHOOL "GRADUATES"? HOW CAN YOU PREPARE FOR THE POST-SECONDARY APPLICATION PROCESS?

The Homeschooling Office recommends parents start visiting postsecondary institutions with their 16-year-old student. It is important to become aware of the programs the student might be interested in applying for. Ask the admissions office what the requirements for admission would be for those programs. Whatever the admission requirements might be, the student would then have a few years, grades 11 and 12, to meet the needed requirements and prepare for the admissions process. For example, a student interested in entering vocational studies, like to become an electrician, might need to have the Manitoba Curriculum grades 11 and 12 math on their student transcripts. If that's the case, the student has options to ensure those math courses are completed. The Liaison Officers at the Homeschooling Office would explain the high school options available to help the student meet admission requirements. Some of these options may have fees, like online high school courses cost \$350 per course. Because the process is specific to each student, we recommend calling your Liaison Officer to walk through possible pathways for the student.




